Our final day is this Wednesday where we will receive feedback and set goals for the next four years. In 2019 when I started at SAHPS, we were at 'Renew', our overall performance over the last 4 years has been identified as 'Stretch'. Our goal moving forward is to move to the 'Influence' quadrant. 
Differentiated School Performance Groups

Mixed Netball



Stay well this winter & shortage of Casual Replacement Staff

We are experiencing a significant rise in flu/cold (Covid cases) for both students and staff this term. As you would be aware, the Covid Guidelines have changed with the passing of time, reflecting changing conditions. Current Covid Guidelines require staff to stay home for 5 days if they contract Covid. For students, the guidelines recommend a 5-day stay at home from school. Whilst it is not a requirement for students, we would strongly recommend that parents consider doing so to keep our school a healthy place to learn and work in. We ask that any student showing signs of illness does NOT attend school. As per department guidelines, if any student is presenting with compatible symptoms such as sore throat, cough, fever, or cold-like symptoms, a parent/guardian will be required to collect the student as soon as possible.

St Albans Heights Primary School always endeavours to cover teacher absences with a Casual Relief Teacher (CRT). In recent weeks this has become increasingly difficult to do, with higher number of staff absences due to illness/Covid and CRT shortages across the state. We do our very best to replace absent teachers, but this isn't always possible. Staff and students have been extremely flexible and the leadership team have had to take classes to avoid splitting a grade.

Keeping our school community well and safe

Parents, carers and students are encouraged to practice prevention measures, including:

- washing and sanitising hands regularly
- avoiding touching eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands
- covering nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing
- wearing a mask if needed
- staying home if unwell and consulting a general practitioner (GP) or Nurse-on-call as required
- staying up to date with flu and COVID-19 vaccinations.

A reminder to families to keep checking COMPASS regularly for all information regarding events taking place. It is really important to meet the deadlines for providing consent in order to assist smooth organisation for the school staff. Once events have closed on COMPASS students will not eb able to attend.






FOUNDATION - GRADE 2 NEWS 1/2 BY MS NICOLE, MS MIRELLA & MS REBECCA






Sam in the pit.

Following our visit by numerous native animals a couple of weeks ago, students are currently drafting information reports about an animal that they encountered. They have been collecting information under various categories such as diet and habitat.



Our inquiry unit has been focused on the various habitats native animals may be found in. Students. Have been learning the features of various habitats and how we rely on them. We have then made connections to how we need to look after these environments.

In Reading, students have been exploring the structure and features of Explanation texts. These tell us how or why something happens.

Through reading various explanation texts, students have focused on identifying key information and practised taking notes. These notes were then used to support students in Writing their own Explanation texts. Topics have included explaining heat transfer, the water cycle and how caterpillars become butterflies.

In Mathematics, students have been exploring fractions and the relationship between fractions, decimals and percentage.


The final weeks of term will see us focusing on the relationship between addition and subtraction and the most efficient strategies for solving equations.







In Inquiry, students have continued their chemical science focus. We made predictions about what would happen when combining vinegar and baking soda inside a balloon. Students watched excitedly as the chemical reaction between the two caused a gas (carbon dioxide) to bubble and foam. As the gas had nowhere else to go, the balloon expanded and self-inflated right in front of our eyes.

May 27-June 3 was National Reconciliation week. We listened to stories such as 'Say Yes' and discussed what it means to 'be a voice for generations'. Students considered and drew pictures of what a reconciled future could look like.

How a water cycle works!


Did you know? The water cycle doesn't stop. Water moves in a cycle between the surface of the earth and to the atmosphere. There are three stages: evaporation, condensation and precipitation. Another thing a water cycle is caused by sun heat.

Evaporation is liquid to gas, also it's the process that changes liquid water to gaseous water [water Vapor] Evaporation occurs when energy [heat] forces the bonds that hold water molecules together to break. As the sun heats water in a puddle, the puddle slowly shrinks.

Condensation is gas to liquid, also it's the process by which water vapor in the air collides with cold surfaces, or when there's too much humidity in your home. Change of water vapor into droplets is called condensation.

Precipitation includes rain, hail, snow, drizzle and sleet. Liquid water evaporates into water vapor.condenses to form clouds, and precipitates back to the earth in the form of rain and snow. Precipitation forms in the clouds when the water vapor condenses into bigger and bigger droplets of water.

<u>Collection</u>: This is when water that falls from clouds as rain, snow, hail or sleet, collects in the ocean, rivers, lakes and streams. Most will infiltrate [soak into] the ground and will collect as underground water. The water cycle is powered by the sun's energy and by gravity.

How a Caterpillar Transforms into a Butterfly. By Nadia Lin

A caterpillar has four stages of life before becoming a butterfly. The <u>egg, the</u> egg hatches, the chrysalis and finally it turns into a butterfly.

The egg

A mother butterfly flies around choosing the perfect leaf to lay her eggs. When she finally finds the perfect leaf, she lays her eggs on that leaf. Sometimes the mother butterfly doesn't lay them all on the same leaf or in <u>clutches</u> but she lays them individually on each leaf and then the butterfly leaves the eggs after laying them.

Hatchery

After the baby larva is ready to come out. It chews its way out and after its body is fully out it then it eats its shell and the leafs under it...and maybe the leaf next to it. It then eats for 4-6 weeks and grows up to 25,000 times larger!

After eating and eating the caterpillar sheds its outer layer up to five times and it has already regrown a new exoskeleton underneath. Sometimes its new layer is too small so the caterpillar puffs in air to stretch it.

Chrysalis

It's chrysalis time the caterpillar sheds its final skin and finds a branch it then proceeds to hang upside down and forms a sort of cocoon called the chrysalis. It then goes inside the newly formed cocoon, seals itself up for 3-4 weeks. Inside something magical happens to the caterpillar, it's legs become thinner and longer it sprouts wings then antenna's. Its body becomes thinner and longer. It takes shape or becomes a butterfly. The larva is now a pupa.(in the middle of being an adult or child such as a larva)

Adulthood

When the butterfly's body has fully taken <u>shape</u> the butterfly is now ready to come out. <u>Of course</u> more than ten days of not eating the butterfly is ready to eat

but when the butterfly comes out it's wings are all crumpled up, wet and soggy. After a couple hours of waiting the blood rushes back to its wings and then the butterfly goes from flower to flower picking out a flower. Did you know that butterflies can't taste with their tongue? They taste with their feet. If they like the taste of the flower it sucks the pollen with their hollow tongue crouph.





Heat transfer by bicky


This is about thermal radiation and other facts about thermal radiation which can cause a thermal reaction and there are 3 stages condensation radiation precipitation. When 2 Metal balls clash it well cause a thermal reaction and if you rust one of the balls and cover one of the balls in aluminium foil it well be a thermal reaction.

Condensation gives lots of energy to the fire and cold <u>muleclus</u> go down hot ones go up and heat energy from the heat source and the air gets hotter and hotter <u>then</u> they well go up because they are not hot.

Heat when radiation touches titanium it will make it really hot and it won't burn, since it's a solid material that makes it a conductor and anything made from titanium and steel will be a conductor.

So if we are talking about a hot air balloon it will heat the balloon up, since hot go up mucles, the Balloon is full with mucles, and they are really hot it will cause it to go up. And when it cools down it will cause it to go slowly down.

If we are near a fine go away quickly don't go on the top of the flames because it's hotter than any other spot on the fire and if you're in a cold place. Then go to the fire and put your hands on the top and feet on the bottom and if you want to make one you're on this can give you information about heat transfer.



Science Works Trip 5/6s



Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

Same day notification of absence.

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible on the day of absence using one of the following methods:

- 1. Compass: log the absence directly using the Compass app.
- 2. Telephone 93664211: the school office and let the staff know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent, and you need to know if your child isn't at school. Since the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day. Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the Attendance Policy which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.






